Skin Cancer Awareness

We are raising awareness of the risks of skin cancer and ways you can help to reduce your risk. 86% of cases of melanoma are preventable yet increasing numbers of people are being diagnosed with this type of skin cancer. There are now more than 16,000 new cases each year in the UK.

Being sun-safe and regularly checking your skin for any changes are two really important ways you can reduce your skin cancer risk.

Risk factors:

- a previous non-melanoma skin cancer.
- a family history of skin cancer.
- pale skin that burns easily.
- a large number of moles or freckles.
- taking medicine that suppresses your immune system.

• a co-existing medical condition that suppresses your immune system. Regularly checking your skin for signs of skin cancer can help lead to an early diagnosis and increase your chance of successful treatment.



WALK IN STANLEY SPENCER'S FOOTSTEPS

and enjoy refreshments at the Vintage Tea Room in Sandham Memorial Chapel A gentle circular walk through the countryside that inspired one of Britain's greatest war artists

Trail Overview: 2.5 miles - Footpaths, paved roads, grassy fields, and a footbridge with steps. Some muddy sections in wet weather. Uneven paths and slopes make the full walk challenging for some, but a shorter paved alternative is available.

Walk Directions:

1. **Begin at the Chapel:** Admire Spencer's murals in the chapel before starting 2. **Cross the Railway Bridge:** Turn left outside the chapel. Cross over the old railway. Take the first left down Pound Lane. Spot Sandham House (second on the right).

3. Ox Drove Track: Continue to the end of Pound Lane, curving onto the Ox Drove. Walk straight for 100 yards until a kissing gate appears on your right.

4. Footpath to Church: Go through the gate and follow the tree-lined path across fields to the Church of the Ascension.

5. **Route Options:** Shorter Route: Exit churchyard via the main gate onto Harts Lane. Turn left to return to the chapel.

Full Trail: Exit near the war memorial. Follow the path behind the church, through fields and gates, down Jacob's Ladder, and over the footbridge. Arrive at Spring Lane.

6. Old Station House: Return up Spring Lane. Old Station House on left.7. Return to Chapel: Turn left at the top, cross the bridge, and finish your walk back at the chapel.

The Church Pages

OW JESUS

Dear Friends,

In thinking about what to share with you this time, as we approach the time of year when some of our regular activities take a break, I began looking for a hymn that refers to holidays and rest. Sadly, I have failed to find any suitable examples other than *Summer suns are glowing* and a few offerings rejoicing about the delights of summer in New Zealand!

This has made me think about how we regard the place of rest and relaxation in the church. There are many hymns and songs about work and commitment and church unity and creation (especially when it is linked to the harvest season), but very little material praising God for his gift of Sabbath, of a holy day.

We live in a society that is 'on the go' twenty-four hours, seven days a week – if you feel the need to go shopping at 2.00am, there will be places to go, albeit for a fairly limited selection of items. The constant pressure to deliver results and replies as quickly as possible is becoming the 'norm' and emails are regularly flagged as urgent, demanding they immediately jump to the top of the priority list, no matter what else the day might have held.

Our faith is based on the life and teaching of one who 'from time to time... would withdraw to remote places for prayer' (Luke 5:16). This is not just about stopping the regular routine to find space, which is important for the recharging of batteries, both physical and emotional, it is also about an intentional move to engage with God through his gift of prayer. It is about the opportunity to explore and experience the prayer that we do not share in corporate worship; the kind of prayer that encourages us to simply spend time in God's presence without feeling that we have to say or do anything: the prayer of a human being, rather than a human do-ing.

So, in these 'summer' months, whatever the weather decides to do and wherever you find yourselves, may I commend to you the sentiments of William Henry Davies and invite you to 'withdraw to [a] remote place to pray'...

What is this life if, full of care, We have no time to stand and stare. No time to stand beneath the boughs And stare as long as sheep or cows. No time to see, when woods we pass, Where squirrels hide their nuts in grass. No time to see, in broad daylight, Streams full of stars, like skies at night. No time to turn at Beauty's glance, And watch her feet, how they can dance. No time to wait till her mouth can Enrich that smile her eyes began. A poor life this if, full of care, We have no time to stand and stare.

I'm delighted to say that our Plant Sale on 31st May raised over £2,000, all of which will be spent in due course on repair and restoration work at St Mary's. This is our best result ever, and reflects the generous plant contributions given by so many people (and then bought by others!). Our warm thanks to all.

We haven't guite gone firm yet on the date of our planned return to Frith Herb Farm at harvest time, although it looks likely to be in the third week of August. Our past two visits there have been amongst the most popular events we have ever run, giving a fascinating glimpse into a totally different world. The format of the day is that the party splits into two, with one half being shown the processes of drying the herbs, and distilling oils from them, while the other half is taken by trailer out to the herb fields about to be harvested. Then after a picnic lunch, the two parties swap over. Numbers will be limited, and first offered to Friends by means of a Newsletter. Should there be any spaces not taken up by Friends, there will be the opportunity to put your name on a reserve list, on a first-come basis (or why not consider just joining the Friends – individual annual subscription only £10, or £20 for a family!)



Nature Notes

This past month has been one of nests and eggs. It began with our neighbour showing us a frame from his beehive in which a wasp had begun building its

nest. The greyish little cone-shaped structure was abandoned half-finished, so perhaps the wasp realised its mistake! Seeing a comb up close was such a privilege – we could see a queen's cell, about the size of a cashew nut, that hangs vertically from the rest of the worker bee cells.



Most of the blue tit chicks fledged without us seeing them, though we spotted one hopping uncertainly on the patio immediately beneath the bird box. The parents were in the vicinity, so hopefully it was well cared for and found somewhere safe eventually. Once we know the family had moved on, we checked the box and sadly found one under-developed chick had passed away in the nest, as well as a tiny unhatched egg. Blue tit broods can hatch in asynchrony, meaning that earlier-born nestlings can out compete their younger, weaker siblings for food.



There is a mysterious hexagonal formation of white eggs on the underside of our pond plants – I wonder if they are shield bug eggs, but we will have to wait and see if we can catch them hatching. We certainly have lots of shield bugs in the garden, which we love to spot as they have some beautiful colours on their 'shield'-shaped backs.

Another kind neighbour alerted us to a new family of ducklings on the brook, and the next day I *heard* them first – cheeping away with mum quacking reassuringly in reply – then spotted them swimming downstream, darting in and out of the foliage. I counted ten in total – good luck mummy duck!

²² July in the Garden

The summer is rushing by. Gardens have been wonderful, with only a few light frosts this year, and this has enabled many plants to exceed themselves. Roses have been exceptional, and clematis have been complementary to the roses. When grown close together, I just think that they are such a good combination.

The gaps in the borders, where the spring bulbs have died back, can still be filled in with bedding plants. It is always a good idea to sow some late seeds for this purpose. Continue deadheading, and cut back plants that will give you a second flush late summer – autumn, e.g. delphiniums

Time to cut back irises and divide, before the clumps become too large and difficult to work with. Conifer hedges can be cut back now, also cut off all that unwanted growth that appears on tree trunks. The sorbus species of trees have this growing habit.

At the moment of writing this, we have had little rain, so ponds will need topping up, and many plants in the garden would welcome some watering. Feeding would also be beneficial with all the growth plants have made this year. When cutting lawns in the dry weather, try not to take the blades too low, otherwise the grass can go brown. Grass will recover very quickly when it rains again, but brown does not look good if the grass is taken too short.

The vegetable garden will be producing plenty to harvest now: beetroot, courgettes, onions, peas, potatoes, spinach, garlic, and salad leaves. Tomatoes will be ready; do take care with watering as this will affect the fruit, remember to feed regularly as tomatoes can become diseased with blossom end rot and tomato blight. Herbs can be dried now for winter use.

Strawberries have been huge this year. If your plants are three years old, it could be time for some new ones, this will give you better results for next year rather than struggling with the old plants. Runner beans that have reached the top of their support, pinch out the tips of the leading shoot, this will encourage side shoots that will produce more beans. Sow spring cabbage and winter salad leaves.

Weeds are always a problem. Where it is possible, hoe on a dry day, hoping the sun will shrivel the seedlings. I have read mulching the soil with a layer of dry grass mowings suppresses weeds. This could work, but have not tried it yet.

Flowers to enjoy this month: hollyhocks, sunflowers, phlox, poppies, verbascum, zinnias, companulas, alstroemeria, hebe, astrantia, verbena, and roses.
