Kingsclere Cricket Club's Strong Start to the 2025 Season

The 2025 league cricket season is well underway with hard wickets and fast outfields. Our first Saturday league fixture was against Old Basing 2s at the Fieldgate Centre. A strong bowling and fielding performance restricted Old Basing to 194 for 9 off their 45 overs. In reply, the batsmen were in aggressive mood with Ross Andrews scoring 50 off 31 balls. Ed Lyle made 100 not-out off 51 balls, ably supported by Keith Enters, 21 not out, seeing KCC home, winning by 7 wickets with 19 overs to spare.

The midweek team won its first fixture against Stratfield Turgis / Hartley Wespall by 50 runs. Nearly all the batsmen made double figures in setting a dominant total of 173 off 18 overs. Roger Jones and Ed Lyle took two wickets each, but it was Chris Hanney who finished off the opposition with 4 for 22.

We had less success in our second Saturday fixture away to Whitchurch. Pete Frith, Dan Jones, and Jack Grove White contributed the majority of the runs as KCC set Whitchurch 144 to win. We made Whitchurch work hard for the win, taking six wickets before they passed the total.

The midweek team took the points from their second fixture as Basingstoke Hockey Club conceded the match.

We have never 'lost' prescription requests which come in via the NHS App. By embracing this digital solution, you're taking a proactive step towards managing your health efficiently while supporting the NHS in delivering faster, more streamlined services.

There are a number of staff at Watership Down Health who can help assist you with the NHS App. Our Receptionists will try and help but sometimes, you might need to be referred to one of our managers. We also have a number of our PPG who have received training to help. Please ask via Reception if you need help.

Notification on the NHS App

The NHS are increasingly using the NHS App to send patients important notifications and messages. We recommend that all those NHS App Users allow notifications via the App.

Covid Vaccine Programme

The NHS national booking system is open for Spring Covid-19 vaccination bookings for those eligible able to book appointments until 17 June 2025. Following JCVI advice, this Spring's eligible cohorts include:

Adults aged 75 years and over by 30 June 2024 Residents in care homes for older adults Individuals aged 6 months and over who are immunosuppressed

Unfortunately, the NHS England 'rules' do not allow us to permanently decline a patient from a vaccination programme as patients may change their minds at a future point. When we can, we do allow patients to decline from the invitation sent.

Hampshire Hospitals have confirmed that the letter regarding the result will come from the Lung Health Service directly and whilst your GP Practice will get a copy of the letter in time, it is through the hospital that patients need to follow up any enquiries about this service.

Nature notes

I'm sure the A339 *drives* many of us bonkers with the slow traffic, but this month it has afforded our family several opportunities to see brown hares in the adjacent farmland. Driving back to the village from the Vyne, we caught sight of two, one sitting upright in the middle of an arable field, the other sprinting away towards the hedgerows, so distinctive with its enormous hind legs pumping like pistons and huge ears. Brown hares (*Lepus europaeus*) are the UK's fastest land mammal, and can reach speeds up to 40 mph. I was surprised to learn they are not originally



native to this country and are thought to have been introduced by the Romans.

We've been eagerly checking our pond each day to check on the growth of the tadpoles which turns out to be agonisingly slow, for my husband and I as well as our impatient toddler. Still no legs! (The tadpoles, not the toddler.) But we were overjoyed to spot a newt, hiding in the algae. We assume it was a smooth newt, the most common to be found in garden ponds, as it was tricky to get a good look at it. He stayed for three days, and we have not seen it since. It's likely to be looking for a mate. Newts eat tadpoles, as well as insects, slugs and worms, and our pond is well stocked for snacking.

The bluetits are still busy in and out of our birdbox. No sign of the fledglings yet but mum and dad's feeding activity has increased, so hopefully it is a sign the chicks are growing and hungry. I can sympathise with mum there.

In our depleted nature climate, it feels like a relief to see a few butterflies in the garden. I spotted a male Orange-Tip (see picture) on the wing a little early, but perhaps it was this very dry May that has encouraged it out. It's easy to know it is a male as the females do not have the orange tip.



Lastly, what a joy it has been to see the hawthorn flowering abundantly in so many parts of the village, including in our own garden. I've loved watching the tiny white petals drifting down in the breeze, sprinkling a snowy covering over the dark green nettles.

Hi,

I have an hourglass on my desk, which I often use as an arbitrary measure of some quiet time. When all my plates seem to be spinning OK on their own, I can take a few minutes and just centre myself, reconnect with God, and feel His peace.



The other day, as I watched grains of sand funnel through the waist, I had a sense of the preciousness of time. It doesn't matter if you're the CEO of a large corporation, or a barista, if you're raising a family of five, or live on your own, we all only have 24 hours in each day.

As the grains fell, I pictured each one as an hour of our life passing from future to past. And when they are in our past, we can't reuse them, can we? Every hour that passes means there's one fewer in our future. We can't just invert the hourglass and use the grains again.

Time really is so precious!

Yet, most of us waste copious amounts of time. A 2012 study concluded that the average guy has spent ten thousand hours playing video games by the age of twenty-one.

Imagine what you could do in ten thousand hours! Become fluent in another language, get a degree, learn and get good at a new skill, say cookery or carpentry.

Or you could beat level four of Call of Duty.

The average American spends 705 hours on social media every year and 2,737 hours watching TV. I don't suspect the average Brit is all that different.

We all have a choice how we spend our time, that's true, and if video games or social media are your thing, then that's your choice. But as someone who's just lost a loved one quicker than expected, I'd like to urge you to consider what you do with the time you have left on this planet. Once time is gone, it's gone.

Henry David Thoreau, in his famous book, 'Walden', writes of going into the woods for two whole years to slow down and simplify his life. He says, "I wished to live deliberately".

The Apostle, Paul, wrote, "look carefully how you walk, not as unwise but as wise, making the best use of the time" (Ephesians 5: 15-16).

Time is precious – so how will you spend yours? Will you squander it on trivial things, or deliberately invest it in your future? Or make deposits into an eternal inheritance with God?

The poet, Mary Oliver, wrote that, "attention is the beginning of devotion". What are you possibly giving too much attention to? Our lives are the sum of what we give our attention to, after all.

All I'm trying to say is, spend your hours wisely and deliberately, and be careful what you give your attention to.

Don't waste the one thing we cannot recover – our time.







June in the Garden

As the weather warms up, the garden will be awash with colour . Roses should be at their best. Remove the faded flowers to encourage further blooms. There are a few varieties that only bloom once but those will still need to have their old



flowers removed. I like to cut a few inches (centimeters) below the old flower head, just above a leaf as this keeps the rose plant tidy and encourages new growth.

Green fly has appeared early this year and roses are a favourite,. Spraying with soapy water help, if you can't bear to rub them off with your fingers. Pinks flower this month. These super plants are a bonus if you have a well drained spot in the garden, as they like a hot sunny site. They also dislike organic matter, preferring a poor soil. I'm sure most gardens have just that location. They have a long flowering period plus perfume. They are worthy of space in a rock or gravel garden.

As I write this we have had little rain for several weeks and many plants have needed watering and feeding. I fear when it does rain, the ground is so dry it will be difficult for the rain to penetrate. The trees and plants seem to be doing well, regardless of the lack of rain.

The blossom was exceptional this year, no doubt because of the absence of heavy frost. Hopefully we will not have any late frost to spoil the tender plants.

With the weather warmer, if you are fortunate to have a greenhouse, keeping it well ventilated is a must. I have read recently it is best to keep the temperature to 20°C.(85°F.). Sometimes plants shut down and stop growing when dry and scorched. Pests can also be a problem in the greenhouse. I use the yellow, sticky, fly traps, hoping to catch the white fly. I feel that this is better than using chemicals..

There is still time to plant hanging baskets and tubs. Any bare spaces in the flower beds can be planted with summer bedding plants; bulb leaves can be cut back now, Hellebore flower heads and seeds should be removed and general deadheading needs to be done to encourage a longer flowering period. Cut back any shrubs that have finished flowering as this will keep them tidy. Ponds need attention, thinning out any excessive growth of aquatic plants. If the plants are three plus years old, they may be lifted and divided. In the vegetable garden, peas will be ready to harvest, plant out runner beans, and outside tomatoes. Some seeds can still be sewn, e.g. oriental vegetables, salad, vegetables, turnips, and herbs.

Not cutting the grass in May that has been encouraged to help the insects, has been a good idea this year as there has been so little rain. Plants to enjoy this month, paeonies, hardy geraniums, tree lupin, lavender, achillea, honeysuckle. bearded Iris, weigela, mock orange, and the Rock Rose
